

The Blessedness of the Intermediate State

Revelation 20:4-6



⁴ Then I saw thrones, and seated on them were those to whom the authority to judge was committed. Also I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded for the testimony of Jesus and for the word of God, and those who had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. They came to life and reigned with Christ for a thousand years. ⁵ The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were ended. This is the first resurrection. ⁶ Blessed and holy is the one who shares in the first resurrection! Over such the second death has no power, but they will be priests of God and of Christ, and they will reign with him for a thousand years.





Option 1


The 1000 years of Rev 20 is literal and futuristic on this earth distinct from the age to come.

Option 2

The 1000 years is symbolic of a very long time and the 1000 year kingdom is in heaven presently.

Option 2

John is describing the intermediate state after death and before the bodily resurrection @ the Second Coming of Christ



The major advantage to Option 2 is the degree to which John is now describing something that both Jesus and Paul affirm to be true.

The intermediate state is the time between death and the bodily resurrection at the coming of Jesus in heaven.

Let's be absolutely clear:

We are <u>not</u> having a discussion as to the legitimacy of the intermediate state.

That is a biblical fact without Revelation 20.



The truth is:

Without Revelation 20, scholars would not believe in a literal 1000 year kingdom on this earth before the eternal kingdom.

And the intermediate state doesn't need Rev. 20.



Jesus describes the "intermediate state" as a kingdom. Paul teaches the reality of the intermediate state and also describes it as a kingdom:

- Luke 23:42-43
- John 18:36
- 2 Corinthians 5:8
- Phil 1:23
- Hebrews 12:23



Luke 23:42-43

 And he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

 And he said to him, "Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise."



John 18:36

 Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world."



2 Corinthians 5:8

 Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord.



Philippians 1:23

• I am hard pressed between the two. My desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better.



Hebrews 12:22-23

 But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, ²³ and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God, the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect,

Paul also affirms the reality that there is presently a heavenly kingdom.



Colossians 1:13

 He has delivered us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of his beloved Son,



2 Timothy 4:18

 The Lord will rescue me from every evil deed and bring me safely into his heavenly kingdom. To him be the glory forever and ever. Amen.



#1 The first reason I believe John is describing the Intermediate State is the degree to which this interpretation can be supported by other NT passages.

I am NOT denying the existence of a 1000 year kingdom. Instead, I am saying:

- a. It exists in heaven.
- b. It is longer than a 1000 years in length.



Revelation 20:4



Then I saw thrones,

and seated on them were those to whom the authority to judge was committed.

This goes all the way back to Chap 4

#2 The second reason I believe John is describing the Intermediate State is the specific description of seeing thrones which are all previously described as being in heaven.

Where are these thrones that John saw?



There is <u>not</u> a single references to thrones on the earth in Revelation.



Revelation 4:2



At once I was in the Spirit, and

behold, a throne

stood in heaven,

with one seated on the throne.

Revelation 4:4



 Around the throne were twentyfour thrones, and seated on the thrones were twentyfour elders, clothed in white garments, with golden crowns on their heads.

Revelation 11:16



•And the twenty-four elders who sit on their thrones before God fell on their faces and worshiped God,



Look Back @ Revelation 3:21 to a promise given to those who conquer



Revelation 3:21



•The one who conquers, I will grant him to sit with me on my throne, as I also conquered and sat down with my Father on his throne.

Where is the throne that Jesus is describing here?

Is Jesus presently reigning? Yes. Jesus said,

"My kingdom is NOT of this world."

If Christ is presently reigning and He grants to us the privilege of being seated with Him on His throne are we not reigning with Him?

And where is Christ presently reigning from?



#3 The third reason I believe John is describing the Intermediate State comes from a comparison of Revelation 6:9 to 20:4.

The language is too identical for me to ignore the similarities.



Revelation 20:4b



 Also I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded for the testimony of Jesus and for the word of God, Celebratua, 50 years of Proclaiming, Christ, BEREAN BAPTIST CHURCH

Where have we heard this language before?

Comparing Revelation 6:9 to 20:4

6:9	20:4
Now when the Lamb opened the fifth seal,	Then I saw thrones and seated on them were those who had been given authority to judge.
I saw	I also saw

Truth


Everyone (many Bible scholars) agree that Revelation 6:9 is describing the Intermediate State.

The issue is: Do we let Revelation 6:9 inform our thinking on chapter 20 or ignore it.



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And NOT just those who were beheaded



Revelation 20:4



•and those who had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands.

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If we get very literal in our interpretation we have a big problem.

If option 1 is correct and John is referring to a literal 1000 year kingdom of this earth after the return of Christ then according to 20:4 only those who were beheaded and only those who did not take the mark of the beast or worship its image will get to enter that kingdom.

They are the ones who came to life and reigned with Christ for 1000 years.



Revelation 20:4



 Also I saw the souls of those who had been beheaded for the testimony of Jesus and for the word of God, and those who had not worshiped the beast or its image and had not received its mark on their foreheads or their hands. They came to life and reigned with Christ for a thousand vears.

Some Bible scholars see Isaiah 11 as further proof of a 1000 year kingdom because the language in the chapter.

For example,

"The nursing child shall play over the hole of the cobra..."

But the same chapter says,

"and together they [Judah and Ephraim] shall plunder the people of the east."

What if John is NOT describing a future 1000 year kingdom?

Is that a problem?



What is the most compelling biblical reason why we need another 1000 years of life on this earth with sin, the flesh, death and another giant battle before we enter the eternal age to come?

I have NOT found an answer.

Even with Satan eliminated there will still be sin, temptation, sickness, and death.



What if John is writing to encourage those believers who have lost a loved one, a family member, a husband, a father, their preacher to the persecution of the beast?

What does he say to them?



Revelation 20:4



They came to life

These are the words we need to focus upon.

Yes, they were beheaded BUT THEY CAME TO LIFE!

Yes, they suffered a brutal and violent death BUT THEY CAME TO LIFE!

Yes, they were burnt to death BUT THEY CAME TO LIFE!

Yes, they were fed to the lions BUT THEY CAME TO LIFE!



Revelation 20:5



•The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were ended.

The rest of the dead refers to unbelievers—those who are NOT saved.

- These are the earth dwellers.
- They took the mark of the beast.
- They worshipped the image.



Revelation 20:5



 The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were ended.

The thousand years is a symbolic number representing the ultimate in completion.

 $10 \times 10 \times 10 = 1000 \text{ or } 10 \text{ cubed.}$

It is very similar to the 144,000.

Which is 12 x 12 x 1000.

Only God knows the length of the intermediate state but it is a very long time.



Thousand: A Semitic way of saying "an infinitely large number."

John MacArthur

2 Peter 3:8

Now, dear friends, do not let this one thing escape your notice, that a single day is like a thousand years with the Lord and a thousand years are like a single day.

Psalm 50:10

For every beast of the forest is mine, the cattle on a thousand hills.

Deuteronomy 1:11

May the LORD, the God of your fathers, make you a thousand times as many as you are and bless you, as he has promised you!

Deuteronomy 7:9

Know therefore that the LORD your God is God, the faithful God who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments, to a thousand generations,

Revelation 20:5



 The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were ended.

The rest of the dead come to life in order to be judged from the books described in v. 12.

Turn back to Revelation 11:18



Revelation 11:18



 The nations raged, but your wrath came, and the time for the dead to be judged, and for rewarding your servants, the prophets and saints, and those who fear your name, both small and great, and for destroying the destroyers of the earth."

Four Things Happen in Revelation 11:8

- 1. The wrath of God is poured out.
- 2. The dead are judged (this requires their resurrection).
- 3. The saints and servants of God are rewarded (this sounds like the JSofC).
- 4. The destroyers (Satan, beast, false prophet, demons) are destroyed.

When an unbeliever dies:

- 1. Their soul immediately goes to hell.
- 2. At the return of Christ they are resurrected to be judged.
- 3. At which time they are judged and subsequently thrown into the lake of fire.

Acts 24:15

 having a hope in God, which these men themselves accept, that there will be a resurrection of both the just and the unjust.



Biblical Fact

Apart from Rev. 20:5

There isn't any other Bible verse that chronologically separates the resurrection of the saved and unsaved.

Not one.



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Turn to John 5:25-29



John 5:25

 "Truly, truly, I say to you, an hour is coming, and is now here, when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear will live.



Who are the dead in John 5:25?

Everyone agrees they are the spiritually dead who if they believe the gospel will live.

Yet in the same conversation, in the same pericope, Jesus moves to discussing those who are in the tombs or are physically dead.

John 5:26

 For as the Father has life in himself, so he has granted the Son also to have life in himself.



John 5:27-28

 And he has given him authority to execute judgment, because he is the Son of Man. 28 Do not marvel at this, for an hour is coming when all who are in the tombs will hear his voice



John 5:29

 and come out, those who have done good to the resurrection of life,

 and those who have done evil to the resurrection of judgment.



Now lets' talk about the words "first resurrection."

Only John adds "first" in front of resurrection.



Revelation 20:5



• The rest of the dead did not come to life until the thousand years were ended.

This is the first resurrection.

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Turn Back to Matthew 22:31-32



Matthew 22:29-30

 And as for the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God: 32 'I am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? He is not God of the dead, but of the living."

John calls this the first resurrection to establish a contract between the resurrection of the body that will occur when Christ returns.

At this point, John is writing to encourage those where were martyred (beheaded/slain) for the cause of Christ.

You, early church, believer need to know that your loved one who died for not taking the mark of the beast is now alive with Christ.



Notice how John establishes a "second death" in v. 6.

Again no other writer employs the term "second death."



Revelation 20:6



 Blessed and holy is the one who shares in the first resurrection! Over such the second death has no power, but they will be priests of God and of Christ, and they will reign with him for a thousand years.

John is NOT creating a 1000 year gap in time between the resurrection of the just and the unjust.

Instead, John is explaining that those who do not die in Christ do not experience life when they die and they are not in heaven.

They instead are waiting for the 'second' resurrection where they will be judged out of what was written in the books.



John's use of First Resurrection and Second Death in Revelation

Death (physical)

First Resurrection Second (soul life in heaven)



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This is not John's first use of Second Death



Revelation 2:10-11



 Do not fear what you are about to suffer. Behold, the devil is about to throw some of you into prison, that you may be tested, and for ten days you will have tribulation. Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life. 11 He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches. The one who conquers will not be hurt by the second death.'

Comparing Revelation 2:10-11 to 20:4 & 6

2:10-11	20:4 & 6
Be faithful unto death,	who had been beheaded
give you the crown	and reigned with Christ for 1000 years.
Of life	Came to life
The one who conquers will not be hurt by the second death.'	Over such the second death has no power, but they will be priests of God and of Christ, and they will reign with him for a thousand years.

One of the arguments presented for a 1000 year kingdom on the earth after the return of Christ is the necessity of reigning with Christ, but Revelation describes this as happening presently in heaven and in the future forever.



Revelation 22:5



 And night will be no more. They will need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they [his servants] will reign forever and ever.
