Let me remind you why we look at multiple translations @ Berean. We are trying to get after the truest meaning of that text possible. We want to know what did Jesus mean? What did his apostles mean? What was their intent? What did they want us to comprehend from their words?

The KJV translates Strong's G1933 in the following manner: gentle (3x), patient (1x), moderation (1x).



Let's look at three other times this same Greek word is used in the NT.



KJV Strong's G1933 matches the Greek ἐπιεικής (epieikēs).

"gentle*" AND "G1933" occurs in 3 verses in the KJV.


- Tit 3:2 To speak evil of no man, to be no brawlers, but gentle, G1933 shewing all meekness unto all men.
- But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, G1933 and easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy.
- Servants, be subject to your masters with all fear; not only to the good and gentle, G1933 but also to the froward.

Titus 3:1-2 (NET)

 Remind them to be subject to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work. ² They must not slander anyone, but be peaceable, gentle, showing complete courtesy to all people.







4:5. A practical way to have joy is by exhibiting gentleness to all. This lets the church and world see that you belong to the Lord. The Greek word *epieikēs* means "yielding, gentle, kind." It includes the ability to go beyond the letter of the law in treating others, to provide something beside strict justice. It does not insist on personal rights or privileges. Christ embodied such gentleness in his dealing with all people.
