
Philippians 1:27

intimidated will be a sign.**





Philippians 1:28 (ESV)

- This is a clear sign to them of their destruction, but of your salvation, and that from God.

At this point, we are going to look at v. 29 and then at a similar text from Paul to gain a better understanding v. 28.

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Only Two Options

1. Complete and total destruction—that is annihilation.
2. Eternal separation from God in a place called hell.

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Philippians 1:29

•For it has been granted to you that for the sake of Christ you should not only believe in him but also suffer for his sake,




Acts 9:15-16 (NKJV)



Suffering for Christ Must

Be distinguished from:

- Stupid Decisions
- Irresponsible Choices
- Sinful Behavior
- Repercussions of living in a fallen world

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**We must be very careful in
what we say concerning
suffering. Assigning God
responsibility for all suffering
in the world will not do.**



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Since the beginning of the church there has always been a group of 'Christians' who in the name of defending God's character have sought to minimize several things.

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Minimize


- God's Sovereignty
- God's Responsibility for Suffering
- God's Judgment and Eternal Punishment

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**Here is one example of
what I am talking
about:**



Lately I've been thinking about life. *A lot.*

I've also been thinking about the line we tell people when they're going through sad chapters in life: "Well, this is all part of God's plan."

But is it, really? Is *all this* part of God's plan? Looking back at the times people have said this to me in the midst of suffering, I find myself shaking my head that we'd believe such a thing.

Not only does that line fail to bring me comfort, it also seems to impugn God's character. The idea that a loving God would have a "plan" that involved wiping out thousands in earthquakes and tsunamis, giving people cancer, parents losing children, car accidents, trauma, abuse, and all manner of pain and suffering, is an insane idea.

Think about it: if this is all "according to God's plan" and every life event is being directed and controlled by him, *he's really bad at making plans.*

In some of my saddest seasons of loss, people have come along side of me and said, "Well, we'll never really understand God's plan."

And every time I hear it, through my tears and suffocating sadness I just want to reply, "*No_____, Sherlock.*" How could a plan that involves so much heartache be understood?

Sure, I understand what we're trying to do when we say it. We're trying to make ourselves or others feel better, and trying to make sense of sadness and suffering. The best way we know how? Apparently it's to believe that our suffering was all planned by God, and thus must have some deeper, mysterious beauty we haven't discovered yet.

Sometimes we'll say God planned the suffering for our benefit. Other times we'll be tricked into believing that God planned the suffering to chastise us for not measuring up. Yet, no matter how we try to rationalize or explain it, we end up at the same spot: if this is all part of God's plan, God is the author and cause of evil and suffering.

As well meaning or desperate for answers as we may be, trying to fit all of the tragedies and sadness of life into some supposed master plan that God has, creates far more problems than it solves.

I am convinced that any belief or worldview that makes God the agent of causation for our suffering, ought to be rejected. This includes the idea that God has a giant master plan where everything that happens in life is divinely willed and ordained as part of it. In a world of such brokenness, this simply cannot be true.

Instead of saying that God has a “plan,” I am growing more fond of saying that God has a certain desire, a certain will— a certain heart. And that this will, this desire, and this heart, is *always love*. It’s never anything *but love*. This means that whatever God wills, and whatever God desires to bring into reality, is always beautiful and never evil.

God does not will our heartache and suffering. He doesn’t will our losses, and the broken chapters we experience in this life.

Those things have nothing to do with God, and are so far outside of his will, his desire, and his heart, that it’s indescribable.

Instead of trying to rationalize our suffering as being from the hand of God— thus making God an agent to be petrified of instead of a creator to be loved, I think we should be quicker to acknowledge that, no, a lot of what we experience in life isn’t God’s plan at all.

And honestly, we really need to stop blaming him, because we pin some really horrible and tragic life events on him. I can’t imagine it makes him feel good when we actually believe that he caused that car accident, sent the tornado, or gave the cancer in order to fulfill his own really twisted “plan.”

Instead, when we acknowledge that really hard and sad life events did not come from the hand of God, and were not in any way planned by or ordained by God, I believe we’re invited to get to know a God who *joins in our suffering instead of causing it*.

Because you see, if it's outside of God's heart and desires, God grieves that loss and brokenness with us— because it's his hopes and dreams for our lives that end up getting smashed as well.

I don't know how to have a relationship with a God who comes along side me in sadness and suffering and says, "You're going to have to trust my reasons for making your world explode."

But I am learning (I'm trying Ringo. I'm tryin' real hard), how to have a relationship with a God who sits beside me and says, "Yeah, man... this whole thing totally sucks."

Instead of this idea of God having a master plan that meticulously dictates and controls what happens in our lives (often referred to a blueprint theology), I believe that God has hopes, dreams, and desires for our stories. When those things come true, he rejoices and celebrates with us.

But when those hopes and dreams get smashed to bits, instead of saying "Oh, by the way— I actually did that," **I believe God sits in the dark and mourns those broken dreams with us.**

And when the tears have subsided long enough to begin to hear his voice clearly, I'm convinced he's also whispering, "And I know this can't replace your loss, but when you're ready I'd love to partner with you to try to make something good come out of all this."

- In the end everyone gets saved

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
**Before we continue let

1. Hell was prepared for the devil and his angels NOT humans. Matt 25.41.
2. Christ made it clear there are degrees of punishment in hell. Luke 10 & 12.
3. You don't have to go there!

Yes, I know *Sinners In the Hands of an Angry God* well. I had portions of it memorized. It was part of my preacher's arsenal. But long ago I came to regard evangelism by terrorism as immature, manipulative, and unfaithful to the God revealed in Christ. Today I preach *Sinners In the Hands of a Loving God*. At some point we have to decide which picture of God we will embrace and project.

How do we go about choosing? Both pictures can be drawn from the Bible. We do it by asking which picture looks like Jesus. Every other vision of God – from whatever source – is subordinate to the revelation of God we find in Christ. This is why the Apostle John will say no one has ever seen God until they see him revealed in the Word made flesh: Jesus Christ (see John 1:18)

Does the sadistic monster in the “Angry God” sermon look like Jesus? Of course not. So we are free to reject it. We *must* reject it!

2 Thess 1:7-8

But does this mean the wrath of God doesn't exist? No, of course not. The wrath of God exists. But there are important clues, even in the Old Testament, to how we can better understand the wrath of God. For example consider Psalm 7:11-16...

God is a righteous judge;

God sits in judgment every day.

If they will not repent, God will whet his sword;

he will bend his bow and make it ready.

He has prepared his weapons of death;

he makes his arrows shafts of fire.

These three verses make it sound like God directly visits retribution upon sinners. But look at the next three verses...

Look at those who are in labor with wickedness,

who conceive evil, and give birth to a lie.

They dig a pit and make it deep

and fall into the hole they have made.

Their malice turns back upon their own head;

their violence falls on their own scalp.




2 Thessalonians 1:7-8 (ESV)

The psalmist shows that what we might think of as God's whetted sword is in reality the pit of self-inflicted punishment that we dig with our own hands.

Sin has consequences. We dig a pit of sin...and eventually we fall in. We act in malice...and eventually it returns to haunt us. We employ violence...and eventually it boomerangs back on us. We can call this the wrath of God. The Bible does. But it should not cause us to think that the Father of Jesus is the vindictive and retributive god of the Old Testament. That is the God of the Lord's infamous sermon.





Revelation 19:15 & 21

- **And out of his mouth goeth a sharp sword, that with it he should smite the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron: and he treadeth the winepress of the fierceness and wrath of Almighty God.**
- **And the remnant were slain with the sword of him that sat upon the horse, which *sword* proceeded out of his mouth: and all the fowls were filled with their flesh.**

Yes, sin has consequences, and sometimes they are truly horrible consequences. But the deeper truth is that we are more punished **by** our sins than **for** our sins. Jesus has made this known to us. Jesus tells us that the Father is kind and merciful...even to the evil and ungrateful. (see Luke 6:35-36)

What I want to tell you is that God's attitude (spirit) toward you is one of unwavering, unconditional, fatherly/motherly love. You have nothing to fear from God. Let the fear of God be understood as the wisdom which recognizes that reality as God has created it has consequences. But the truth that we live in a consequential universe with a moral arc, does not mean that God views sinners as loathsome spiders. He does not. God looks with unconditional love upon all his sons and daughters... even his prodigal sons and daughters.

**If we are more punished by our sins

biblical truth—why did Christ die
“for our sins”?**

- 1. The Bible does not teach that God's love is unwavering and unconditional toward all people at all times.**
- 2. Everyone should fear God. Hebrews 10:31.**
- 3. If we live in a consequential universe w/ a moral arc God created it that way and it—the moral arc is God NOT God.**
- 4. I agree the Bible does not teach God looks at sinners a loathsome spiders.**



Hebrews 10:31


